* The "Statement by US Economists on Iraq" has now been signed by 7 Nobel laureates and 180 other prominent American economists. This project has been a real success story for ECAAR. We are working with Win Without War, True Majority and Move On, and members of the Security Policy Working Group to publicize the statement to the widest possible public. We have organized press events and released the statement to US and international media: the story has been picked up as far afield as China and Australia. The statement has been circulated as a "Dear Colleague" letter in the House of Representatives, and we are working with Senator Tom Daschle's office to publicize our arguments in the Senate. Typing the words "economists" and "Iraq" into the Google search engine yields the ECAAR home page as the top result.

* In a separate statement 41 Nobel Laureates in Science and Economics (several of them members of ECAAR) signed the following statement:

"The undersigned oppose a preventive war against Iraq without broad international support. Military operations against Iraq may indeed lead to a relatively swift victory in the short term. But war is characterized by surprise, human loss and unintended consequences. Even with a victory, we believe that the medical, economic, environmental, moral, spiritual, political and legal consequences of an American preventive attack on Iraq would undermine, not protect, U.S. security and standing in the world."

* Our next project is to assist with the development of peaceful solutions to the economic and security crisis in North Korea. At this point we are gathering a list of possible collaborators. * On March 6, 2003 a German affiliate of ECAAR was officially formed in Bonn. The Chair of the new affiliate is Wolfram Elsner and Michael Brzoska is the managing secretary. They expect to have an initial membership of about 30, and are already planning several events, including a one-day workshop in the fall, and presentations at several conferences in Europe. As more specific information becomes available we will post it here.
