Spurred by the release of the last of the Star Wars movies, EPS member Ahmad Faruqui asks, "Star Wars or Earth Wars?"

"[I]f you strip the exotic location and the stunning special effects, the film is a gripping portrayal of the arrogance, anger and hostility that drive people to make war on planet Earth. By not calling it "Earth Wars", Lucas ensured that millions of people seeking to escape the real wars going on around them would become moviegoers.

"Addressing the Asian defense ministers in Singapore earlier this month, an indignant US Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld asked why China — which faced no immediate threat — was increasing its defense spending in consecutive years by double-digit percentages. Such high spending rates, he said, could destabilize the Asian military balance. One may, of course, ask the same question of Rumsfeld. The only known enemies of the US are non-state actors that hardly justify the type and level of military spending that it is engaged in."

In the interview she talks about her work as co-director of the Global Development And Environment Institute (http://ase.tufts.edu/gdae/), attempting to comprehend both the limitations of the mainstream economic paradigm, and also the wide range of creative efforts that have been and are being made to extend our economic understanding.

"Reaching out to researchers and other readers, in academia and elsewhere, I have edited two book series. One, "Evolving Values for a Capitalist World," deals with questions like how to

steer different elements in a society toward a more long-run vision of what matters; various approaches toward corporate responsibility and irresponsibility; or how to understand the relationship between rich and poor, in terms of what kinds of assistance are and are not useful. Gen. Donald Alston, the chief US military spokesman in Iraq, commented last week, echoing other senior officers. "It's going to be settled in the political process." http://www.truthout.org/docs 2005/061405A.shtml The chairman of the House Homeland Security Committee said Wednesday that technology developed for the war on terrorism could also benefit the US economy.

Representative Christopher Cox (R-Calif.) said the war on terrorism will be "an indefinite struggle," and he challenged private companies to develop technology that enhances security and makes the US economy stronger.

"Our job is to sustain this war on terror by making investments in security that actually improve America's economy," Cox said during a keynote speech at the 2005 Government Security Conference in Washington. "Can we, as we introduce new security technology into some productive process, make that production process simultaneously more efficient?"

Experts said the **world is not addressing the dangers of Russia's loose "nuclear stash"** at a conference in Tokyo June 8th. Their conclusion: "Nuclear weapons are the greatest danger to the world, with the slow pace of dismantling Russia's arsenal [is] of particular concern as terrorists seek out nuclear material."

"The gravest danger in the world today is the threat of nuclear and other weapons of mass destruction," said former US senator Sam Nunn, who heads the Nuclear Threat Initiative set up in 2001 by governments and international groups. Faced with the threat, "our responses are changing very slowly - far too slowly," Nunn told a conference in Tokyo. He said the failure to secure nuclear materials would make it easier for a group of terrorists or a non-nuclear state to acquire nuclear weapons.

Japan will move its **sea-based missile defense research project to the development stage** in the next fiscal year, Defense Agency chief Yoshinori Ono said June 5th. "The time has come to move to the development phase," Ono, who was in Singapore for the Asia Security Conference, told reporters. "I would like to have arrangements made within the government swiftly and submit the budget request for fiscal 2006."

The project is being undertaken jointly with the US. The cost for the first fiscal year, which begins next April 1, is expected to amount to several billion yen, he said.

One confirmed reports that Japan and the US will jointly carry out the first missile interception test for the sea-based Standard Missile 3 interceptor next March in Hawaii.


A California engineering firm has agreed to pay \$700,000 for violating US export rules by selling equipment to nations of proliferation concern without a license, the San Bernardino (Calif.) Business Press reported recently.

The US Commerce Department determined that Wilden Pump and Engineering Co. shipped special pumps to Iran, China, Israel, Syria and the United Arab Emirates. The machinery, designed for use in the chemical and pharmaceutical industries, could be used to create biological or chemical weapons. The department requires companies to receive an export license before shipping such equipment to those countries.

"The size of the penalty assessed to Wilden is due to the significant number of violations, many of them with knowledge that the shipments were destined to an embargoed country," said the Commerce Department in a statement.

The department said Wilden committed 71 Export Administrative Regulation violations between 2000 and 2003. Wilden shipped pumps 26 times without the required license, according to the department, and on 22 of those occasions Wilden shipped the pumps knowing a violation would occur. The department also said Wilden made false statements on export documents 23 times.

Canada is spending hundreds of millions of dollars to secure nuclear reactors, as well as mines and research facilities that handle radiological material, in the face of a potential terrorist attack. About \$240 million was appropriated as a one-time allocation to secure the sites, and continuing annual expenses are estimated to be around \$48 million, according to a newly published handbook of regulations proposed by the Canadian Nuclear Safety Commission. Proposed new regulations include a permanent armed presence at all nuclear plants.

United for Peace and Justice, the largest antiwar coalition in the US, seeks **summer interns** for organizing, outreach, research, and more.



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Action Corner

One of the important tenets of EPS's mission statement is "to promote collective approaches to conflict and security problems; to encourage the submission of international disputes to negotiation, arbitration, or judicial settlement, through the United Nations or other

multinational institutions for the settlement of controversies." President Bush's nominee for US Ambassador to the UN appears not to support these same goals. John Bolton has consistently shown contempt for international cooperation.

An open letter from 67 former US diplomats, State Department officials or officials of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency states, "John Bolton has the professional background needed for this position. But his past activities and statements indicate conclusively that he is the wrong man for this position... John Bolton has an exceptional record of opposition to efforts to enhance US security through arms control. He led a campaign against ratification of the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty... John Bolton's insistence that the UN is valuable only when it directly serves the United States, and that the most effective Security Council would be one where the US is the only permanent member, will not help him to negotiate with representatives of the remaining 96% of humanity at a time when the UN is actively considering enlargement of the Security Council and steps to deal more effectively with failed states and to enhance the UN's peacekeeping capability."
