Women hold less than 30 percent of senior positions in the US Executive Branch, according to a new study by Women in International Security (WIIS), a global organization that supports women in peace and security careers.

Executive Branch, is the first ever produced on this topic. Based on over 90 interviews, this study attempts to fill the information gap on women in international security at the federal level. The report reveals that there is no shortage of women who want to pursue a career in government, but there are gaps in leadership training, formal mentoring programs, and support for workplace flexibility. According to the research, effective leadership and management are critical factors in women's retention and advancement. 	Last week, US and Russian Presidents Obama and Medvedev met in Prague to sign the new START treaty that makes significant cuts in both countries' dangerous nuclear arsenals - an incredibly important step forward in moving toward a world free of nuclear weapons. This agreement reduces the deployed strategic nuclear weapons for each country by 30% and sets the stage for negotiations for deeper cuts in the world's 23,000 nuclear weapon stockpile. This Treaty enhances international stability and is essential for strengthening US security. Before the US can follow through on this historic commitment though, the treaty must be approved by the Senate. You can play a critical role in ensuring its success. 	Senators John Kerry (D-MA), Lindsay Graham (R-SC) and Joe Lieberman (I-CT) are expected to unveil their new climate bill in the next week or two. Published reports indicate that the bill will include subsidies for the nuclear power industry.	

	Nuclear power is both ineffective at reducing carbon emissions (its carbon footprint is 6 times greater than wind power for the same amount of electricity, 2-3 times greater than solar) and the most dangerous and expensive electricity source available. In no way would it fight climate change; in fact, it would be counterproductive.
