Stiglitz Says US Faces "Anemic Recovery,"	Needs More Stimulus in Bloomberg article by Michael Heath

"Nobel Prize-winning economist Joseph E. Stiglitz said the US economy faces an 'anemic recovery' and the government will need to enact another round of 'better designed' stimulus measures.

"The Obama administration took 'a big gamble and it doesn't look like it's paying off,' Stiglitz told Bloomberg TV in an interview in Sydney... 'The recovery is so weak that it is not strong enough to generate new jobs for the new entrants in the labor force, let alone to find jobs for the 15 million Americans who would like a job and can't get one.'"

Can we afford endless war? In *The Chicago Tribune* on August 5, 2010, Steve Chapman says Minding our own business would be cheaper – and safer.

"Scholars Joseph Stiglitz of Columbia and Linda Bilmes of Harvard published a book in 2008 called 'The Three Trillion Dollar War,' which gives a more realistic estimate. But that, too, is an understatement. They figure that when all long-run costs are factored in, the tab will be at least \$5 trillion and could reach \$7 trillion, or nearly twice as much as this year's entire federal budget.

"And that was two years ago. I asked Bilmes for an update, and she said some obligations, like veterans' medical and disability compensation costs, 'have exceeded our earlier projections.' Do I hear \$8 trillion?"

UN head shows resolve to realize nuke-free world within his lifetime from The Associated Press, New York, August 2, 2010.

"The United Nations chief reiterated his commitment Monday to realizing a world without nuclear weapons within his lifetime and expressed his will to serve a second term to continue working on world problems such as nuclear disarmament, poverty reduction and climate change.

"UN Secretary General Ban Ki Moon made the remarks in an exclusive interview with Kyodo News at John F. Kennedy International Airport prior to his departure for Japan, where he will visit Hiroshima and Nagasaki to send a 'strong message to the international community' calling for nuclear disarmament.

"Asked whether he hopes to see a world without nuclear weapons during his lifetime, Ban said, 'That's my goal.'"

How to make Smart Growth affordable by Jonathan Hiskes for Grist, August 4, 2010

"Let's say you want to live in one of those fancy Smart Growth developments that green urbanists are always going on about. Let's say you want to live in *any* neighborhood with transit service and a grid that encourages walking and biking. Great. Living in a walkable, transit-connected neighborhood can save you money on gas and car maintenance, and maybe even eliminate the need for a car altogether. But it will cost you too, because housing in dense areas is pricier on average than housing in spread-out suburbs.

"Mortgage lenders could help make walkable urban homes more attainable by offering location-efficient mortgages (more on those later) — but it would take a concerted effort from the Obama administration to make it happen."

A Detailed Analysis of the Fiscal 2010 War Supplemental, by Louis Hellman and Laicie Olson, July 31, 2010, for The Center For Arms Control And Non-Proliferation

"The final version of the fiscal 2010 war supplemental was approved by the House on July 27, 2010 by a vote of <u>308-114</u>.

"After <u>some amount of back and forth</u>, the Senate's original version of the bill, passed May 27, was approved by the House. The bill contains \$58.8 billion in spending, including \$37.1 billion for the war, over \$13 billion for Vietnam veterans exposed to Agent Orange, \$5.1 billion for FEMA, and \$2.9 billion for Haiti disaster relief, as well as a host of smaller expenditures."
