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Crisis in the States and Cities: What Should Be Done?

An EPS Bernard Schwartz Symposium

States and cities face tax increases and sharp cuts in vital public services, with likely harsh effects on economic activity and competitiveness going forward.

This public symposium on April 12, organized by EPS discussed the budget crises faced by state and local governments including cuts to social services and increasing taxes. Will budget cuts help, as some claim or hurt, as others believe the economies of affected jurisdictions and the country?

The panelists presented action plans for a federal role, including revenue sharing, and the possible federalization of Medicaid.

United States Peace Index

The Institute for Economics and Peace (IEP) released the inaugural United States Peace Index April 6, 2011.

The United States Peace Index (USPI) is the first-ever national ranking of US states by their levels of peacefulness. The Index provides an analysis of the economic costs related to a lack of peace in the United States, and finds that a reduction in violence and crime would result in hundreds of billions of dollars, comprised of savings for government at the federal and state level and additional economic activity. The Index also looks at how economic, health, education and demographic indicators across the country impact peace and the US economy.

Friends Committee on National Legislation: Genocide Prevention Month

April is Genocide Prevention month, marking a series of commemorative anniversaries for the Holocaust and the Armenian, Bosnian and Cambodian genocides. Seventeen years ago, the rapid slaughter of innocent civilians started in Rwanda. After each of these horrific events, the US and the international community vowed "never again." Yet today, the US is still not well-equipped to carry out its commitment to help prevent genocide. Over the past decades the international community, including the US, has largely stood by and watched as mass atrocities were perpetrated in Srebrenica and Darfur. Years of underinvestment in civilian tools like diplomacy, development, and international cooperation have crippled the US' ability to help prevent atrocities across the world. Leadership and pressure from Congress is needed now to ensure that the policy gaps and capacities in the US government are filled and maintained beyond any one administration.
