A Guide to Statistics on Historical Trends in Income Inequality

"The broad facts of income inequality over the past six decades are easily summarized:

- The years from the end of World War II into the 1970s were ones of substantial economic growth and broadly shared prosperity.
 - Incomes grew rapidly and at roughly the same rate up and down the income ladder, roughly doubling in inflation-adjusted terms between the late 1940s and early 1970s.
 - The income gap between those high up the income ladder and those on the middle and lower rungs while substantial did not change much during this period.
- Beginning in the 1970s, economic growth slowed and the income gap widened.
 - Income growth for households in the middle and lower parts of the distribution slowed sharply, while incomes at the top continued to grow strongly.
 - The concentration of income at the very top of the distribution rose to levels last seen more than 80 years ago (during the "Roaring Twenties").
- Wealth (the value of a household's property and financial assets net of the value of its debts) is much more highly concentrated than income, although the wealth data do not show a dramatic *increase* in concentration at the very top the way the income data do.

"Data from a variety of sources contribute to this broad picture of strong growth and shared prosperity for the early postwar period, followed by slower growth and growing inequality since the 1970s. Within these broad trends, however, different data tell slightly different parts of the story (and no single source of data is better for all purposes than the others)."

As warmongering escalates, the US and Israeli military and intelligence establishment continues to speak out against an attack on Iran, warning that bombing Iran could result in a catastrophic regional war and would encourage Iran to develop nuclear weapons.

Many of the same politicians and pundits who misled the United States into invading Iraq are now clamoring for a new war of choice.

President Obama and Congress should do everything in their power to prevent war with Iran, support diplomacy, and speak out on the following points:

- Top military leaders and national security experts agree: diplomacy is the most effective way to prevent a devastating war and a nuclear-armed Iran. As Yuval Diskin, Israel's ex-Chief of Internal Security has warned, "Attacking Iran will encourage them to develop a bomb."
- US and Israeli intelligence agree: Iran is not building a nuclear weapon and has not made a decision to do so, allowing time for diplomacy to prevent a nuclear-armed Iran.
- Diplomacy with Iran is not a sprint, it's a marathon, and as the 8/14/12 New York Times editorial pointed out, "There is still time for intensified diplomacy. It would be best served if the major powers stay united and Israeli leaders temper loose talk of war."
