Mexico Peace Index

The Mexico Peace Index measures the state of peace in Mexico over the last decade.

The Mexico Peace Index (MPI) aims to provide a more localized view of peace within Mexico and to determine what conditions are associated with peace at the state level. The Index measures the state of peace in all 32 Mexican states from 2003—2012.

The MPI uses the same definition of peace as the Global Peace Index (GPI) whereby peace is "the absence of violence or the fear of violence."

World of Drones: How Unmanned Aircraft Are Extending American Hegemony

The expanding global net of drones extends into the Pacific, linked to the surveillance operations of the National Security Agency.

Drones were initially developed for surveillance missions. The iconic MQ-1 Predator debuted during the Balkan wars, surveying the operations over Bosnia, tracking the movement of Serbian troops in real time and providing hours of surveillance data by staying in the air for longer than previously possible. The use of drones for offensive operations was only fully realised with the US-led "war on terror," targeting al-Qaida and its associates. "Signature strikes" in Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Yemen have generated much controversy, especially covert operations by the Central Intelligence Agency, with many civilians killed, many more feeling targeted, and little or no accountability from the authorities.

UN Launches audio content by phone

DPI will launch a new service which offers UN audio content by phone. This innovative new service is offered by provider AudioNow. It allows mobile users to access UN audio content by calling in a local access number without the need for a smartphone or apps, and using voice minutes rather than data plans, making it the least expensive way to access such content. The numbers are also accessible from landlines.

The UN Audio channels will include UN Radio broadcasts, live coverage of meetings, press briefings, news and feature segments, all available through a "call to listen" service to mobile phone users in multiple languages in regions across the globe. The service will launch in the US, followed in early 2014 by South Africa, Brazil, and Switzerland, then in selected countries in Europe, Middle East and North Africa, and the Caribbean.

Human Development Index

Human development is defined as the process of enlarging people's freedoms and opportunities and improving their well-being. Human development is about the real freedom ordinary people have to decide who to be, what to do, and how to live.

The human development concept was developed by economist Mahbub ul Haq. At the World Bank in the 1970s, and later as minister of finance in his own country, Pakistan, Dr. Haq argued that existing measures of human progress failed to account for the true purpose of development — to improve people's lives. In particular, he believed that the commonly used measure of Gross Domestic Product failed to adequately measure well-being. Working with Nobel Laureate Amartya Sen and other gifted economists, in 1990 Dr. Haq published the first Human Development Report, which was commissioned by the United Nations Development Programme.

Support a Level Playing Field for Clean Energy Master Limited Partnerships (MLP) Parity Act

Right now, Congress has an opportunity to level the playing field on which renewable energy competes with fossil fuels for private investment.

For decades, fossil fuel producers have benefited from the ability to form a special kind of corporate structure, known as Master Limited Partnerships, that gives them access to low-cost financing and special tax benefits. But when Congress created Master Limited Partnerships in 1980, they left out renewable energy.

Congress can unlock billions of dollars of low cost financing for clean energy by allowing renewables to be eligible for an important tax benefit that the oil, natural gas, and coal industries have had for decades.
